Dear Friends,

This year we celebrate MAKE WAY FOR BOOKS' 15^{th} anniversary of empowering families, children, and early childhood educators to make early literacy and reading a priority every day. Over the last 15 years we have served over 150,000 children and parents, placed 226,405 books into homes, and provided programs and opportunities for children to fall in love with books and reading. We are grateful for the support and generosity of all of our volunteers, donors, board members, advocates, and staff who make this impact possible.

Together we have made books available in homes, preschools, childcare centers, clinics, WIC offices, and many other locations families frequent. We have provided professional development and early literacy support to early childhood educators and home-care providers. And we have empowered parents and families to make reading to their children part of their daily routine. However, for every child, family, and educator that we have impacted, there are still others waiting for assistance.

The need in our community is great. Three out of every four 4th graders in Arizona cannot read proficiently. However, this problem begins long before children enter 4th grade. In Pima County 33% of children enter kindergarten not "ready to read." Poverty amplifies achievement gaps in Tucson where one in three children live in poverty. Learning inequalities become apparent by age four when children from low-income families will have heard an average of 30 million fewer words than their more affluent peers. Education is essential to the civic engagement, productivity, and success of children who will be the future students, adults, and leaders of our community.

Our commitment to a better community begins with an investment in the future of our children who deserve the right to quality education and the early literacy skills necessary for success before they step foot into a kindergarten classroom. With your continued support, we will intensify our efforts to ensure that the children, families, and educators of southern Arizona have access to quality books, early literacy education, and a more equal opportunity to succeed.

We graciously present our 2013 annual report and share our favorite MAKE WAY FOR BOOKS stories; the stories that are truly changing lives.





Jada and her mother Jasmin first met MAKE WAY FOR BOOKS through Raising A Reader. Each week Jada received a red book bag filled with four books to take home, share, and return for a new set the following week. Jasmin and Jada participated in activities and craft projects that built on the stories they read together. Each week Jada took one book home to keep. After the first class, Jasmin started recruiting her neighbors to bring their children as well.

The families in Jada and Jasmin's Raising A Reader group grew close throughout the 12 week program and did not want it to end. Inspired by a love of reading, and supplied with a special lending library donated by MWFB, the families created "Raisina Our their own Family" group that still reads together today. The mothers at "Raising our Family" have grown with their children and the stories they have shared are changing the lives of not only the children but also their parents, who with increased confidence, themselves as their child's first, best teacher.









Book M.A.G.I.C. (Making a Giant Impact on Children) is a bilingual family literacy program that reaches out to families who often do not have access to formal childcare by meeting them in their homes, play groups, parent classes, resource centers and in other community settings. The Book M.A.G.I.C. program empowers parents to be their child's first, best teacher by providing them with early literacy information and strategies, take-home books, and engaging reading readiness activities.

CONNECTING LANGUAGE & CULTURE

In the MWFB Make Way for Babies & Toddlers program, families are educated on the importance of reading to their children beginning at birth. New parents receive kits filled with baby books, reading strategies, and early literacy information. However, reading aloud can be a struggle for many new parents who have limited English language skills. MWFB programs empower parents to pass on the gift of their language and culture to their children by reading and speaking to them in their primary home language.





MWFB partners with Pima County Public Library to provide new and gently used books at social service agencies and medical clinics throughout Tucson and southern Arizona. Families can enjoy books while awaiting services and then take them home to keep.



For many families and childcare centers, high-quality books are not within budget. To make books available in classrooms and at home, MAKE WAY FOR BOOKS provides classroom collections of high-quality, age appropriate books in multiple languages as well as a large lending library so that children and parents can share stories together at home.










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"Our mission is to foster and support the success of children in our community through cultivating the love of books and reading.
