You know that many families are struggling. You may know that research tells us that children from low-income homes enter kindergarten as much as two years behind in vocabulary and prereading skills. And, once children are behind, they rarely catch up. **However,** did you know that research also indicates that access to books at home has more impact on a child's academic success than their parent's education level or job? This huge and hopeful fact means that together, we can create monumental change by giving children in our community the chance to read and succeed.

Your dedication and commitment to our mission enabled us to find innovative ways to meet the diverse needs of young children and families in southern Arizona. This meant meeting families where they were out in the community to provide books and high-impact early literacy programming. It also meant beginning a new collaboration with neighborhoood elementary schools to provide programming for the 4 out of 5 young children who do not have access to preschool or quality childcare and connect them to the schools where they will attend kindergarten.

This is the start of an incredible change in our community. I invite you to read through our annual report to learn how, together, we are harnessing the power of school, home, and community to ensure that all young children have access to life-changing early educational experiences.

NEIGHBORHOOD SCHOOL READINESS MO

In 2014, we piloted the Neighborhood School Readiness Model, a coordinated project that engages multiple community partners and combines all of Make Way for Books' work at and around elementary schools where an of 91% of children qualify for free/reduced lunch and a high number of children have poor 3rd grade reading sce met the diverse needs of young children and families in our community by meeting them where they are. As a re thousands of infants, toddlers, and preschoolers have access to early literacy programming.

Our Preschool Program

Make Way for Books partners with more than 180 under-resourced preschools and childcare centers to provide high-quality early literacy programming and to create literacy and language-rich environments for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers. Parents learn how to read books with their children and as a result of the program they share books more regularly. Last year, 763 educators received professional development through 26 content-based workshops and on-site coaching. 95% of educators said the program helped them better support the children in their care. Each week, 53 Storytime Volunteers read to infants, toddlers, and preschoolers at participating preschools and childcare centers.

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Raising A Reader

Families meet at neighborhood schools for weekly family engagement programming. Children and families become familiar with the school while participating in programming that helps children develop pre-reading skills to ensure they enter kindergarten ready to read.

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Cover to Cover

4 out of 5 children in Arizona do not have access to preschool or quality childcare.Through Cover to Cover, we meet families at the Swap Meet, food banks, parks, social services agencies, etc. for weekly programming. Children gain access to books and develop pre-reading skills and parents are empowered with the skills, knowledge and confidence to help their children succeed.

Raising A Reader Intensive

We meet children and families in low-income apartment complexes and mobile home communities with weekly family engagement programming. Children discover the joy of books and develop emergent literacy and language skills. Parents learn that they have what it takes to be their child's first, best teacher.

These words are our mission in action. Your support enabled us to meet families in the community, week after week to provide books and programming that ensures children develop emergent literacy skills. We empowered parents by showing them that they have what it takes to help their children succeed in school and beyond by sharing books and early literacy activities throughout the day. And we connected them to free resources, including our early literacy app which inspires them to share early literacy activities anytime and everywhere by making the world their book. For many families, the first Cover to Cover or Raising A Reader session was a starting point as many have followed Make Way for Books programs from location to location and now join us for programming in our new building.

These are the words of one of the parents in our preschool program which has been impacting children and families for 17 years. We partnered with under-resourced preschools and childcare centers to ensure that infants, toddlers, and preschoolers have access to books in the classroom and at home. Throughout the year we provided ongoing professional development for educators and showed parents how they can share books with their young children to help them thrive in school and in life. Each week, Storytime Volunteers shared highly-engaging storytimes for children at preschools and childcare centers.
